ASS/STANCE



Options include fee-waived assessments, inpatient, outpatient, intensive therapy, group and individual counseling, culturally sensitive and trauma informed care along with a new Recovery Coaching program. The availability of Medically Assisted Treatment (MAT) has also been expanded.

NTERVENTION



24/7 Crisis Intervention Services. Services include telephone support, risk assessment, crisis intervention and stabilization, coordination of emergency hospitalizations, and follow-up with linkage to resources. Maehnowesekiyah's emergency number is 715-799-3835.

Fentanyl is here in our Menominee Communities. IT IMPACTS ALL OF US. Talking about it with your children, family and friends can save lives.

Here's What You Need To Know About Fentanyl



You can't see it, taste it or smell it.



Fentanyl is being added to pills, marijuana and other drugs.



As little as 2 grams can kill.



Harm Reduction



If someone is going to use an illegal substance, they should be using fentanyl test strips to detect the presence of the drug. Test strips are available by contacting Nick/EMS at 715-701-0369.



If you use, or someone you know uses, keep Narcan on hand and learn how to use it. Narcan is available from your provider or by contacting Nick/EMS at 715-701-0369.



Please don't make matters more difficult by re-traumatizing or stigmatizing someone with substance use disorder. Every user is someone's son, daughter, family member or friend.

What Can You Do To Help



The only safe medications are ones that come from a licensed pharmacy.



Safely store medicines. Dispose of medications that are expired or unused. DO NOT THROW AWAY. Instead, take them to the Menominee Tribal Police Prescription Drop Box at W3293 Wolf River Dr, Keshena, WI 54135.



Know the signs of drug use: Loss of interest in friends, family, work or social activities. Sudden secrecy. Missing items or money from your home.



Reach out for help. Don't wait until it's a crisis or the user requests help. Educate yourself and others.

Working together as a community we can reduce the impact of this health emergency.
