The Crisis Response Worker (CRW) coordinates rapid crisis response services between the Menominee Tribal Police Department, Tribal Social Services, and Clinic-Behavioral Health for participants and families impacted by opioid addiction. Family Services & Behavior Health provide family therapy and grief counseling to help families cope with shame and stigma associated with overdose and to help families cope with grief in a healthy way. The CRW will help refer participants to other programs and/or resources as well as accompany them to appointments if need be. The CRW also can provide assistance with gas cards, bus tickets, rides to/from appointments, help with filling out paperwork, and provide any assistance deemed possible.

DEPARTMENT OF AGING AND LONG TERM CARE

Aging and Long Term Care refers Elders who are experiencing abuse to the Menominee County Adult Protective Services, who are available to contact at (715) 799-3861.

Wisconsin state law on elder abuse includes physical abuse, material (financial) abuse, neglect, or self-neglect of a person who is "age 60 or older or who is subject to the infirmities of aging"

Physical Abuse: is the willful infliction of physical pain or injury or unreasonable confinement of an elder person

Material (financial) Abuse: is the misuse of an elder person's property, medications or financial resources

Neglect: is the situation that creates a significant danger to an elder person's physical or mental health because the person who takes care of the elder person is unable or fails to provide adequate food, shelter, clothing, medical or dental care.

Self-neglect: has the same meaning as "neglect" except that refers to an elder person's inability to provide for his or her own needs.

RESILIENCE TIPS

Teaching the language of resilience is no different from teaching the language of a native tongue. We encourage you to help your child learn the vocabulary of resilience and help them practice the concepts daily!



The Ability to Calm Oneself

Managing emotions may be THE biggest skill demanded of a child! Help your child find ways to calm down, like taking five deep breaths.



Expressing Feelings

Help your child learn to recognize different emotions and name them. Validate their feelings.



Give a Child Choices

Learning that every choice has a consequence is essential. This builds decision making skills. Give your child choices any time you can.

TRIBAL FAMILY SERVICES

OVC Social Worker: Funded through the National Office of Victims of Crime

This National program is designed to serve youth and children who are identified as the victims of crime. Anyone can connect with the OVC Social Worker to make a referral for direct services. This includes family members and/or school counselors who identify a victimized youth or child, especially those who are victims of crimes related to substance abuse. Services can include mentoring, connecting to additional resources, advocating, and transportation to and from appointments for that child or their immediate family.

Coordinated Service Team Program

This is a strength-based and family centered approach program designed for youth that have not been successful in traditional services. The Coordinated Service Team Facilitator will meet with the family and assist in creating a team consisting of individuals from the family, school, and community. The CST facilitator then facilitates the team meetings which are initially held once every 1-4 weeks as needed. This program is linked to the Comprehensive Community Services (CCS) program*.

For youth to be eligible for this program, the following criteria should be met:

- \cdot Must be a resident of Menominee Reservation / County
- Age range is 0-1
- · Must be involved in at least two of the following systems: Mental Health, Special Education, Juvenile Justice, Child Protective Services, Alcohol or Other Drug Abuse Services. Other services will be considered
- \cdot At risk of out of home placement, currently placed out of home, or returning from out of home placement
- \cdot Previous interventions have not been successful
- · Participation is voluntary

Family Preservation

The Family Preservation Program at Family Services is a fully funded program that provides counseling and other related services designed to preserve or re-unify families. The major component of this program is Art Therapy and Counseling for children. The Family Preservation Social Worker is a trained Art Therapist and Counselor, trained in art, developmental psychology, counseling theories, and the therapy and counseling process. Art therapy provides an effective support for children suffering from trauma. Art creates a pathway to expression and healing. It assists in exploring the effects of trauma, in building resilience, and in finding strengths. Art therapy/counseling sessions are offered remotely through the Zoom platform or in-person. All art supplies are provided. Sessions typically are set up for 8 weekly 1 hour sessions consisting of checkin/review, art directive/art making, processing, and closure. Goals and objectives are part of the process. Children can be referred through their Family Services social worker, county social workers, the clinic, teachers/staff, school counselors, and parents/caretakers. CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

KĀKĀĒCEC is a diversionary program managed by Probation & Parole which focuses on treatment. It was recently established (pre-2019) for non-violent offenders who are involved in the criminal justice system and are struggling with substance abuse issues. The Tribal Prosecutor makes the referrals and the Tribal Judges orders the individuals to the program. After a defendant successfully completes the program, their criminal charges are dismissed.
