- Adult Programming Plenty is offered for youth, but adults need more. Ex: singles/couples/middle-aged.
- Only socially and physically isolated entertainment options are available right now.
- People are not willing to wait and need instant gratification.
- Services and opportunities, especially for the youth, are primarily in Keshena. More opportunities in the other three communities are needed.

FINANCES AND EMPLOYMENT

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NOW: WEAKNESSES (continued):

Housing

- Vacant Homes Lack of Enforcement of Ordinances
- Vacant/Run down homes Cleanup is needed.
- Homelessness.
- Housing areas need more work to be fully developed housing areas.
- Not enough housing opportunities here Not enough apartments, single-family homes, home ownership options, homeowner repair options, Multi Family situations, elder housing, access to credit/capital to purchase homes, etc.
- Members must move off the reservation for housing needs.
- There is a lot of drug use in Tribal Housing. We need a zero-tolerance policy again.
- Drug Use in Housing Develop a zero-tolerance policy for Opioid Epidemic
- Recovery homes are needed.

HEALTH

- Issues/struggles with Mental Health.

FUTURE: OPPORTUNITIES:

LEGISLATIVE

- Purchase land outside of the reservation boundaries.
- Develop a land use plan to help obligate marginal timber lands for housing and apartments.
- Get our Wisconsin land back.

LANGUAGE, TRADITIONS, AND CULTURE

- Log cabin village for recovery or traditional villages.
- Incorporate ceremony into social life.
- Write our traditions down in a sort of "Manual" that everyone can have access to. A lot of people don't know who to go to. (Menominee names & Ceremonies, etc.) Videos of elders to talk about how to do things to prevent outside people from accessing and using our information During our gatherings we can have it shared. Downsides to a manual: People are learning separately rather than together.
- Menominee-specific recipe book on traditional foods and medicines.
- Tribal members learn how to preserve our food.
- Everyone can learn how to hunt, fish, and gather in season.
- Find holistic options for people in need of support for recovery, domestic violence, and trauma.
- Menominee-specific herbal medicine book.
- More language speakers/ability to converse in Menominee - Teachers & Trainees, all community members.
- Charter Immersions Schools K-12, College.
- Community access and practices for traditional activities or ceremonies.
- More availability for daycare/childcare services

FAMILIES AND YOUTH

- Parent participation with children in all aspects of the child's life
- Social Media use among youth impacts suicide rates, depression, bullying, and other social problems.
- Parent participation Health needs in respect to addiction – The parents have an addiction; we don't assess the kids' health needs.
- Teach a life skills class that focuses on tasks such as cooking, cleaning, personal financial management, basic car maintenance, etc.
- Fragmentation of families due to low housing opportunities - families are separated and it's a challenge to connect and take care of each other.

TRADITIONS AND CULTURE

- Traditional seeds have been lost over time.
- Lack of knowledge of our clans and the responsibilities you were given by your clan.
 Those roles were passed down traditionally and we should start doing that for the community today.
- Reinvigorating cultural roles and practices using indicators.
- Lack of Respect for our knowledge keepers –
 Some keep the knowledge safe within
 themselves and their family to prevent others
 from abusing or misusing it How do we
 approach them with respect, so they are
 comfortable to share? Providing safe spaces.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

 Engagement of community at meetings – Lack of participation in Community Engagement Workshop, MTL, and committee meetings. It is hard to get them to attend.

EMPLOYMENT

- Succession Planning is needed. We are faced with the threat of losing the training and experience we gained when an employee leaves employment with MITW.
- Intimidation in the workplace.
- Staff Burnout
- Employee Retention within the tribe and the casino Keeping good employees.
- It's hard to motivate/support staff and yet hold our expectations for what needs to be done.
 We need to work on traditional ways of incentivizing our staff.
- Lateral violence and internalized oppression in the workplace and in the community – What policies do we have to help these situations? Conflict resolution amongst employees rather than attacking. Meeting to work out conflict rather than ignoring it.
- Lack of succession plan Our policies are so closed and restrictive that they don't allow for alternatives. The language is restrictive.
